**Four Preventable Causes of Trauma-
Related Death**

Many of the most important prehospital interventions have been born in combat and implemented by civilian EMS systems. A review of the military data from the early years of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan has shown that members of the armed forces died from what may have been preventable causes. There are important implications for the EMS community as BLS interventions are the key to successful trauma care as we have seen in Boston, Aurora and the Pulse nightclub. This lecture will provide a brief overview of the data and put emphasis on the physical skills that will save lives.
